- Consider how big your garden is going to be--and how much work it will take to maintain it! Think about whether or not there's enough sun exposure so that each section of your garden will receive enough light throughout the day (or if certain areas get too much light during certain seasons).

Choose native plants for the area where you live and work.

Native plants are simply those that grow naturally in your area. They've adapted to local conditions, so they're more likely to thrive and survive. Native plants are also less likely to be attacked by pests--because they've evolved with them over time--and they require less irrigation because they have shorter roots than non-native species. Native plants offer habitat for local wildlife and help keep the ecosystem balanced.

Use soil conditioner to improve drainage, nutrition, and aeration.

Soil conditioner is an essential component to any landscaping project. It improves drainage, nutrition, and aeration of your soil. To use soil conditioner, simply sprinkle it onto your yard as you would fertilizer or mulch. Be sure to water thoroughly after applying this product so that it can penetrate into the ground where it's needed most!

Consider installing drip irrigation systems to conserve water.

Drip irrigation systems are an efficient way to water your plants. They use less water than sprinklers, and they can be installed on a timer so you don't have to worry about watering your yard every day.

Conclusion

The Central Oregon landscape is beautiful, but it can be hard to keep up with. You need to plan ahead and prepare your garden before you start building it. If you're planning on installing drip irrigation systems or using native plants in your area, we recommend talking with an expert who knows how these things work best!

Why Must the Association Approve My Fence?

Although the association may sometime seem like Big Brother when you want to build a shed or put up a fence, most design review program are actually a benefit—not a burden. Association design standards are based on harmony with the overall community, consideration for neighbors, and high-quality construction practices. The design review program exists to maintain, protect, and enhance the value of property, and it strives for a balance between individual rights and the good of the entire community.

While association members have the biggest stake in property values, others are also very interested in seeing communities well maintained and looking its best. Builders' reputations and lenders' financial support are closely connected to the community. Also, public officials have an interest in maintaining and enhancing the community since tax revenues depend on property values. Associations should try to notify new members of its design review requirements as soon after they move in as possible. If you have not received a copy, contact the manager or any member of the Design Review Committee. Also, be sure to consult the Design Review Guidelines if you're considering any type of exterior design change. These should guidelines contain everything you need to know about the approval process, design requirements, and the association's basic design philosophy. The guidelines should list the changes that don't need to be approved.

Design review committees should make every effort to process applications fairly, reasonably, and quickly.

Contact the chair of the Design Review Committee or the manager if you have any questions.

Be a part of your community Design Review Committee Willingness to volunteer is desired, but particularly interested in members with expertise or experience with construction, engineering, or design. Ask your committee for the list of duties of the committee

Sample duties could include:

- Drafting, amending, and updating design review policies and guidelines.
- Reviewing applications and variances.
- Advising association members on their improvement projects.
- Monitoring construction projects and changes; ensuring they comply with the approved proposal.

Touring the community periodically to verify and identify design violations.
