Security in Your Community

In recent days the Central Oregon community has been rocked by tragic events. We have experienced a double homicide, an active shooter, as well as other less public crimes. It's easy to feel like the bad guys of the world are winning. Crime is increasing in Central Oregon; the increase is inevitable with the population increase we have seen all across our community's. During the last 20



years, our communities have remained below the national crime average for our population. However, statistics rarely make people feel better. In my experience I believe people need to do something to change the way they feel about a situation. So even though Central Oregon is still a very safe community, lets talk about some things we can do to increase your safety and security.

Primarily in Bend, some areas are having a steeper than normal increase in crimes. However automotive breakins, and thefts have increased to a point that many people are feeling the effects. There are some simple things you can do to keep yourself from being a target. The easiest, and most effective is to lock your vehicle. If you have a hard time remembering, you can set an alarm on your phone, or put a note out to remind you, at least until it becomes habit. Its also a good idea to keep your car clean. If a thief looks in your car and sees nothing, (i.e., papers, trash, envelopes, or personal belongings), they are less likely to break in. New and used car lots rarely have car break-ins. If you have the option to park in a garage, do it. Many people fill their garage with things they don't care that much about, while leaving one of there most valuable possessions on the curb.
